Career as a Chief Listening Officer (CLO)

The role of a Chief Listening Officer (CLO) is an emerging career – a job that has only recently come about.

The <u>Study.com</u>. website states that a *Chief Listening* Officer specializes in monitoring both external and internal communications about organizations. Their primary focus is on gathering information from customers and employees in order to develop ways for an organization to enhance their relationships with both.

The EasyUni.com website states that a CLO is the "air-traffic controller" for social media and other content channels. The CLO stays on top of breaking news, gossips, and chats, and circulates information while engaging the audience with its brand. The CLO makes sure that the company is aware of what the public is saying about the company's brand or products.

Working as an Auslan Interpreter

The Good Careers Guide indicates that interpreters use their knowledge of languages and cultures to convert a spoken or signed language into another spoken or signed language, usually within a limited time frame and in the presence of the participants who need to communicate.

Interpreters may perform the following tasks:

- interpret verbal or signed communications between two parties
- provide interpretations of conversations or speeches
- express the meaning and feeling of what is said or signed in another language in the appropriate tone and style within a range of settings
- verbally translate written texts

Good Careers Guide - Interpreter

Auslan interpreters facilitate communication between deaf (or hard of hearing) and hearing people. They can be employed in a wide range of everyday settings – banks, legal meetings, hospitals, schools, TAFEs, universities, retail stores – and work in supporting effective communication.

Courses in Auslan is taught at a number of institutions including Melbourne Polytechnic. These include the <u>Certificate II in Auslan</u> and the <u>Diploma of Auslan</u>.



Working in the Real Estate Profession

Working in the *real estate profession* offers students the opportunity to achieve high levels of personal satisfaction and career success. In general terms, estate agents *lease, manage, appraise, buy, and sell residential, rural, commercial and industrial property or business* on behalf of clients. The first step in establishing a real estate career is to become an agent's representative. Agent's representatives perform a variety of real estate roles under the supervision of a licensed estate agent.

Youth Work and Social Work Courses offered in Victoria

According to the <u>Good Universities Guide - Youth Worker</u>, Youth workers develop and facilitate programs to work with and support young people, either individually or in groups, in order to address social, behavioural, welfare, developmental and protection needs. They work closely with teachers, social and welfare workers, local authorities, health professionals, refuge workers, parents and, in some instances, the police.

Social workers help people to deal with personal and social problems, either directly or by planning or carrying out programmes that benefit groups or communities. They are interested in challenging the structural barriers that contribute to inequality, discrimination, exploitation, and oppression within communities. Social workers can specialise in a range of different practice areas such as children and family, youth, violence, and sexual assault, medical and health, child protection, income support, disability, education, aged care, correctional services, family law, youth justice, community legal, psychiatric and general mental health, refugees and migrants, and Indigenous communities. - Good Universities Guide - Social Worker

Snapshot of The Australian National University (ANU) in 2021

- Although the main campus is based in Canberra in the ACT, ANU is Australia's only national university. It has <u>campuses</u> in ACT, NSW, and the NT.
- <u>Quick statistics</u> about ANU include facts such as ANU being ranking 1st in Australia and 29th in the world in the QS World University Rankings 2021 and, ANU counting six Nobel Laureates among its staff and alumni. It also has one of the highest average academic staff to student ratios among Australia's leading universities according to the Good Universities Guide.
- ANU has seven academic colleges: <u>College of Arts and Social Sciences</u> <u>College of Asia and The Pacific</u> <u>College of Business and Economics</u> <u>College of Engineering and Computer Science</u> <u>College of Health and Medicine</u> <u>College of Law</u> <u>College of Science</u>
- Students wishing to <u>study</u> at ANU can choose from a range of disciplines and degree structures, from single, double and research undergraduate and postgraduate programs.
- At ANU the <u>Doctor of Medicine and Surgery (MChD</u>) is a postgraduate, four-year degree students cannot study medicine as an undergraduate at ANU. Students looking for an undergraduate pathway to medicine without sitting the GAMSAT, might like to consider the <u>Bachelor of Health Science</u>.
- ANU students are encouraged to enhance their learning experience and take advantage of national and international <u>global study opportunities</u> which can count credit towards their degree.
- Prospective and current ANU student have access to many <u>scholarships</u> to support with the cost of their studies.
